Sub Heading

The book of **2Samuel** records what happened to the kingdom after Saul's death. After mourning the death of King Saul, the southern area of Judah anointed David as king, but the northern area of Israel anointed Ishbosheth, Saul's son, as king.

The book of **2Samuel** covers the 40 years of King David's reign. When David was 30, he began to reign over Judah. Seven years later, the entire nation anointed David as king.

David foreshadowed Christ as a victorious warrior and worshiper.

Personal Reflection and Application

Small Group Conversation Guide

In **2Samuel 6:1-12**, David became angry and afraid of God when He struck down Uzzah for touching the ark. David's reaction was to leave the ark with Obededom rather than take it with him to Bethlehem. While the ark was with Obededom, David missed out on God's blessings.

Discuss times when you have put distance between yourself and God.

- What did it take for you to go back to seeking a close relationship with God?

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Leadership Principles from 2Samuel

Danger of Prosperity and Idleness

What weakened David to the point where he fell into sin with Bathsheba [2Sam 11]?

There's a line in a song "Uncle John's Band" (Grateful Dead, Workingman's Dead) that gives us a clue:

"When life looks like easy street, there is danger at your door."

Easy street, prosperity and idleness, are dangerous. David's prosperity gave him the means to feed his flesh. He accumulated wives and possessions against the clear warning God had given to kings in Deuteronomy 17:16-20.

God had crushed all David's foes. The danger and struggle that had kept David in constant prayer were no longer there. He was so relaxed that he didn't even go with Joab to finish off the last of the Ammonites. Being **idle** put David in a position of temptation.
