Reason for the Book of 3John

The book of **3John** is John's letter to a friend commending his good works and warning him about proud men (like Diotrephes).

John's friend, Gaius has found Jesus as the way. In contrast, Diotrephes has found the world as the way.

How 3John Relates to 1John and 2John

In John 14:6, Christ told us He is the way, the truth, and the life. When comparing 3John to 1John and 2John, we see that John has portrayed those three aspects of Christ in his letters.

1John	Jesus the Life
2John	Jesus the Truth
3John	Jesus the Way

You will notice some overlap of these aspects of Christ in the three letters. This is not surprising since John is well aware that they are tightly interwoven. It's difficult to consider each entirely by itself.
